Heart to Heart Chat – 6.30.2024

My dear Friends,
 “The Monk Evagrius Ponticus thus states: We have not been commanded to work, to keep watch and to fast continually – no, this is not demanded – but it has been laid down that we are to pray without ceasing.”

St. Paul presents a similar expectation from his Christians from Thessalonica: “Pray constantly, always and for everything give thanks” (5: 17-18).

Can we keep praying 24/7? Is it even practical given the nature of our daily schedules? We might think that whoever makes such a demand must be crazy. No, it is true that we can pray the whole day provided we learn the right technique to do it. Pope Francis relates to the story of a Russian Pilgrim. When he came across the passage of St. Paul asking his fellow Christians to pray constantly, he was struck with that demand and wondered how to pray without interruption. Even if someone tries to do it, is it possible to get the concentration one needs? Finally, the pilgrim realizes the way to pray constantly through the prayer of the heart. It consists in repeating with faith: “Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner.” When he started to repeat this prayer with consciousness and deep faith, it became part of his breathing. It has become the rhythm of his everyday life. He did not need to quit the work he did because, the prayer was going on in his heart along with the rhythm of his breathing. When we connect this to an image, things may become vivid to all of us. In ancient temples they kept a sacred fire that was burning non-stop. It was the responsibility of the temple priest to keep it burning through out the day and night. Prayer is such a sacred fire that we must keep it alive in our heart day and night without any interruption. St. John Chrysostom preached about prayer that, “Even while walking in public or strolling alone, or seated in your shop, while buying or selling, or even while cooking.” We are not expected to do long wrote prayers but to do little prayers such as: “Lord be with me, Lord be my guide, Lord be my joy, Lord be my light, Lord I trust in you” and so on. Do we think that such little prayers conflict with our daily works and obligations? Such prayers do not contradict our obligations rather through such prayers our daily chores find their meaning. Our daily obligations find their purpose, direction and better clarity through such prayers that constantly bring God into everything that we accomplish on a day. Kindly understand the meaning of such prayers that we can transform our days and make them totally spiritual. Let the Lord of life inspire us to stay connected with Him all the time.
